Executive Committee Proposal

At the December 27 Chanukah/Shabbat program, you will have the opportunity to cast your vote on the following proposal:

We are proposing to have an Executive Committee of four trustees established for voting purposes at the monthly trustee board meetings. We believe that this is necessary because the trustee turnouts have been less than is required for a majority vote of the trustee board.

NOTE: Our bylaws specify a board of Directors of 11 members but we have evolved in to an 8 member board. Our last two board meetings have been attended by 4 officers of the potential eight. We are uncomfortable making decisions in this way so we would like to be accepted as an Executive Committee of the Board of Directors and with agreement of $\frac{3}{4}$ attending be able to make decisions for the whole Board.

My Volunteer Gig

Most Fridays after my morning exercise class, like Superman, I sneak into not a phone booth but the ladies' room, change my clothes (fortunately, the class is such that I don't break a sweat), walk to the rapid, and go downtown to spend three hours at a place I hadn't heard of 10 years ago.

The place is Court Community Service. CCS is a non-profit organization to whom the Cuyahoga County Common Pleas Court and several municipal courts refer people who are convicted of an offense and who are "sentenced" to do community service in lieu of going to jail or paying a fine. It began with a grant from the Cleveland Foundation in 1985. It is run by a staff of six employees (five on Fridays) and numerous (mostly Jewish) volunteers during the week. The volunteers see the clients and work with them to find a suitable placement. We see people with offenses ranging from driving a car with a suspended license to breaking and entering to assault, carrying a concealed weapon, and other serious offenses.

Why so many Jews involved in CCS? In 1988, when the grant ran out, it became a non-profit and created a board that included Peggy Wasserstrom, who rounded up the people she

knew to volunteer. I met her years later along with a current board member, Elisabeth Plax, both of whom suggested CCS to me. I just learned that Steve Mattlin, the current president, is also Jewish.

CCS has a database of about 300 non-profit agencies to whom we send the clients, including churches, housing projects, thrift stores, a literacy program, and social service agencies. So, while our clients are paying their debts to society, they are helping community organizations with free labor. This is a win-win situation, which is why I enjoy being at CCS on Fridays. I meet people with whom I would never have been in contact otherwise but who occasionally tug at my heartstrings with their stories of how they ended up in the court system. Some never seem to extricate themselves from the system and have a thick file of prior arrests, but we do our best to get them into a place where they can fulfill at least one obligation.

Unfortunately, in the past few years, the number of clients we service has gone down, apparently because police officers are not stopping and arresting as many people as in the past. This is true nationally, according to an article in the *Wall Street Journal*. But I keep going even though sometimes I make phone calls when there are no clients to see. I believe it's all worthwhile.




