The Bookshelf



War Against War: The American Fight for Peace: 1914-1918. By Michael Kazin. Simon and Schuster. 2017. Acknowledgments. Key Events. Abbreviations. Notes. Readings. Index. 378 pages.

Every November at something called "Veterans Day" but was once called Armistice Day, we remember the soldiers who died fighting in World War I. However, historian Michael Kazin reminds us that we should also honor those brave Americans who stood up to oppose our nation's drift to war.

Professor Kazin has given us a compelling study of those in the United States who stood up and opposed war and militarism. It is a sketch of the American Peace movement before the Great War (1914-1918). The study brims with life and with memorable sketches of such remarkable women as Jane Addams, Lillian Wald, Carrie Chapman Cott, and Crystal Eastman. Each of these women were social reformers in their own right who then lead the fight against American entry into World War I.

We also learn about such political figures as Senator Robert LaFollette of Wisconsin, Congressman Claude Kitchen (D-NC), who was the leader of the Democratic Caucus in the House of Representatives, and industrialists such as Andrew Carnegie and Henry Ford, who were, despite their many other faults, genuinely opposed to American entry into the "war to end all wars."

Once War was declared by Congress in April of 1917, President Wilson turned on his fellow citizens in the peace movement. Led by Attorney General A. Mitchell Palmer and Postmaster General Albert Burleson, offices were raided, peace publications were banned from the mails, immigrant peace activists were arrested. Several died in police custody while several thousand were deported. Anti-war speakers were attacked by either the police or by "patriotic" mobs. Socialist orator Eugene V. Debs was arrested in 1918 for an anti-war speech he gave in Canton, Ohio. Debs was convicted under the Espionage Act and sentenced to 16 years in prison. The self-righteous Wilson refused all pleas to pardon Debs. In 1921, after Wilson left office in disgrace, the new president, conservative Republican Warren Harding pardoned Debs and invited him to the White House. His health broken by prison, the newly-freed Debs would die four years later in 1926.

For an insightful study of those Americans who opposed our entry into World War I, I recommend this book. For a similar study of the British peace movement, I suggest Adam Hochschild's fine book, *To End All Wars*.

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Anti-Semitism on Rise in U.S.?

Abraham Foxman, retired national director of the Anti-Defamation League, spoke in Cleveland last year and stated that anti-Semitism, although rising globally, was leveling off in the U.S.

Fast forward to February 2017. The Chesed Shel Emeth Cemetery in University City, Missouri, was vandalized by an unknown hate group where 170 headstones were toppled at the historical burial site. Happily, a local Muslim group raised money and helped restore the cemetery.

The Mandel Jewish Community Center in Beachwood was among ten community centers threatened on Monday, Feb. 20, and dozens more threats were recorded in recent weeks according to *The Plain Dealer* of Feb. 25.

Michael Meng, associate professor of history at Clemson University, explains that what we are witnessing today is part of the history of how violence against Jews has unfolded, that perpretrators " target a symbolic space and by targeting that symbolic space, they make it clear they are targeting the entire Jewish community." Prof. Meng points out in a recent interview in the Washington Post that in 19th-century Russia the outburst of violence against Jews took the form of vandalizing cemeteries, synagogues and Jewishowned stores.

Aaron Breitbart (no relation to the right-wing news site) has written that whenever there is an upswing in bigotry against one group of people, all people can fall victim to this movment.
