The Bookshelf



No Country for Jewish Liberals by Larry Derfner. Charlottesville, VA. Just World Books, Inc. 2016. 260 pages.

Just World Books (www.JustWorldBooks.com) has just added a new title to its offering of books on international issues of vital concern. In this new volume, Israeli journalist Larry Derfner gives us his personal and political story of life in contemporary Israel. Born in Los Angeles to parents who were Holocaust survivors, he was active in the social movements of the 1960's before his move to Israel in 1985. He worked as a feature writer and columnist for *The Jerusalem Post*. After his politically-motivated firing from *The Post*, he continued as an op-ed columnist for *Haaretz*. He and his wife Philippa and sons Alon and Gilad live in Modi'in. Israel.

Derfner has always had a kind of "love-hate" relationship with Israel. In his words: "I love the country but hate its policies toward the Palestinian Arabs." He describes how the three Israeli bombing campaigns against Gaza in 2008-2009, 2012, and 2014 helped to turn him into a bitter opponent of the Israeli occupation of the West Bank and the Israeli control and blockade of Gaza. He notes that the last bombing campaign in 2014 (Operation Cast Lead) killed more than 2,200 Palestinians, including 700 children.

He has not always been a critic of Israel. In the 1980's, he supported the second Lebanese War because he felt that Hezbollah's attacks against Jewish farmers in Northern Israel could not be tolerated. However, today, he sees Israel as being in a moral crisis over the continued occupation of the West Bank and over Israel's resulting isolation in the world. He wants the occupation to end, and he sees BDS (Boycott, Divestiture, and Sanctions) as a nonviolent way to pressure Israel to do it.

Toward the end of the book, he poses the following existential question to his fellow Israelis: "If someone or something treated us the way we treat the Palestinians, what should we do?" Indeed, what should we do?

Anti-Semitism on the College Campus

Last month the subject of anti-Semitism on college campuses was examined by members of the House Judiciary Committee and a panel of witnesses who gave testimony on the pervasiveness of anti-Semitism at the university level--or the perceived pervasiveness of this movement.

The panel consisted of representatives of colleges and universities ranging from American University in Washington, D.C., to 3 campuses of the University of California. Other testifying witnesses included spokespeople from the Anti-Defamation League and the Simon Wiesenthal Center.

Title 6 of the Civil Rights Act of 1964 protects Jewish students and other religious minorities from discrimination based on race, color or national origin. However, this act of Congress was not intended to impinge upon the freedom of speech as guaranteed by the First Amendment, even if the language spoken or literature distributed is hateful toward minorities.

Today the classical definition of anti-Semitism is open to interpretation. In past centuries, the meaning was unmistakable: prejudice against Jews as a people. Since the establishment of the State of Israel, however, those who oppose the policies of the Israeli government as they relate to the Palestinian people are considered by Jewish hardliners to be anti-Semitic. Rabbi Andrew Baker of the American Jewish Committee, a member of the panel, considers the demonization of Israel as a new form of anti-Semitism. Question: should the policies of the government

of Israel implicate all Jews? The "old" definition attributed to Jews "imaginary" powers; powers that, in fact, Jews did not possess, stated Rabbi Abraham Cooper of the Simon Wiesenthal Center. "Since the establishment of the State of Israel, the 'powers' are now real," he testified.

The pro-Palestinian position taken by both students and faculty is prevalent on a number of college campuses. They support the BDS movement--to boycott, divest and sanction Israel. How prevalent is this movement on the college level? The representative from the Anti-Defamation League pointed out that anti-Semitic incidents increased by 67% in 2017 over the comparable period in the previous year.

On the other hand Barry Trachenberg of Wake Forest College warns against falling prey to all the headlines, and thinks that the typical Jewish student feels safe on the majority of college campuses.

So, how much of a factor is the anti-Jewish movement on the typical college campus? It depends on who you talk to, and what your definition of anti-Semitism is.
